Urgent reminder about the call for papers

<u>Submissions</u> for the conference can be made here. The first call was made in May and the deadline is **August 1**. This is now urgent if you have yet to respond.

The early bird rate is** \$500 for full members and \$300 for student members (this includes the conference dinner). Please note you must have **paid** by this date for the early bird rate to apply. After this time the rate will be \$600.

This symposium is tailored to both experienced and new researchers who would be prepared to share their decision-making around evidence/data collection and how this relates to their broad investigative goals. News from the Science SIG

The **Science SIG** convened a research strand during the recent science teachers' conference held in Lower Hutt in July. The SIG is working towards formalising a closer relationship with the NZ Association of Science Educators (NZASE), the professional association for teachers.

The full day's research programme at the conference was well attended by conference delegates, with 40 participants in some sessions. Presenters included academic researchers from the SIG community as well as teachers involved in the Teacher-Led Innovation Fund, a presentation from the Ministry of Education on the TIMSS and PISA projects, and a teaching as inquiry project. Important questions were raised about differences between research and project evaluation, and one presentation revisited Graham Smith's 1995 prediction that kura kaupapa Māori education would address the crisis in Māori science education.

Overall consensus was that having a research presence at the conference was an extremely worthwhile initiative, helping to make the research-practice nexus more visible.

A reminder about NZJES themed papers

NZJES is introducing a themed section (3-4 articles) in all issues from 2017, transitioning away from Special Issues after 2016.

Putting together a themed collection of up to 4 articles could be of interest for SIGs or groups of colleagues. These will go through the blind peer review process and will be edited the NZJES editors in the same manner as individual papers.

The editors can facilitate the process and provide advice. The aim is to be more responsive to educational issues, and to publish debates in a more timely way.
